Purpose:

The purpose of this advice letter is to request the recovery of costs associated with Phase 2 of the Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project (MPWSP), consisting of the Monterey Pipeline (I15-400115) and Pump Station (I15-400116) capital projects. The inclusion of the project in rate base will increase plant in service by \$56,217,146. Total cost for the combined projects, excluding AFUDC, was \$50,311,750, consisting of \$46,671,442 for the Monterey Pipeline and \$3,640,309 for the Monterey Pump Station projects. This Tier 2 filing is authorized by California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) D. 16-09-021.

Background:

CAW submits this request to recover MPWSP Phase 2 related costs pursuant to the authority granted in D.16-09-021, Ordering Paragraph 7 (Workpaper 200), which stated that:

California-American Water Company (Cal-Am) is authorized to make two separate Tier 2 advice letter filings to place the costs of the pipeline and pump station into rates. Cal-Am shall file the first Tier 2 advice letter by April 30, 2017 to cover costs for the pipeline and pump station through March 30, 2017, reflecting the recovery of actual costs for the used and useful portions of the facilities to date. Cal-Am shall include a showing with its advice letter that the expended costs are reasonable, and a showing that the pipeline and pump station are sized appropriately for purposes of maximizing reasonable use of the Pure Water Monterey Groundwater Replenishment Project and the Aguifer Storage and Recovery Project pursuant to terms of the Water Purchase Agreement. including optimizing transfers within applicant's system. Cal-Am shall file the second Tier 2 advice letter within 90 days after the pipeline and pump station are completed and fully in service, and shall include a showing with its advice letter that the expended costs are reasonable, and a showing that the pipeline and pump station are sized appropriately for purposes of maximizing reasonable use of the Pure Water Monterey Groundwater Replenishment Project and the Aquifer Storage and Recovery Project pursuant to terms of the Water Purchase Agreement, including optimizing transfers within applicant's system. Commission staff shall follow the guidance stated in the body of this decision in its processing of each Tier 2 advice letter.

The Monterey Pipeline and Pump Station Project is a recently completed component of the MPWSP, CAW's proposed solution to the local area's perennial water shortage. The pipeline, nearly seven miles in length and 36" in diameter, stretches from Seaside to Pacific Grove. It was constructed over the course of two years and is currently in service. The pipeline allows for delivery of additional Carmel River water during high flow periods. In the future, it will also allow for delivery of advanced treatment water from the PureWater Monterey or GWR project, which is anticipated to be complete at the end of this year. Beginning in 2021, the pipeline will deliver water to residents and businesses on the Monterey Peninsula from CAW's proposed desalination facility, which was approved by the CPUC in September of 2018. Construction of the pipeline and pump station was one of the progress milestones ordered by the State Water Resources Control Board in its amended Cease and Desist Order aimed at ending unauthorized pumping of the Carmel River and resolving the Monterey Peninsula's long-standing water supply shortage through the development of an alternative water supply. Timely construction of the pipeline and pump station project shows continued progress towards meeting the milestones in the amended Cease and Desist Order.¹.

Regulatory Requirements:

D.16-09-021 authorized CAW to make two Advice Letter Filings for cost recovery of MPWSP Phase 2. The first filing was authorized to be filed by April 30, 2017 to cover costs for the pipeline and pump station through March 30, 2017, reflecting the recovery of actual costs for the used and useful portions of the facility through that date. However, although substantial work was accomplished by this March 30, 2017 deadline none of the completed facilities could be considered as providing used and useful service at that time. Based on the language of D.16-09-021 CAW determined that since the facilities installed prior to March 30, 2017, were not used and useful it would not file the advice letter seeking cost recovery by April 30, 2017. This opinion was initially affirmed by the CPUC's Water Division management in follow up discussions. However, after further discussions Water Division management recommended CAW submit a project update, without associated cost recovery, to satisfy the Decision requirements. Therefore, at the direction of the CPUC's Water Division, instead of filing an advice letter for cost recovery, CAW filed Advice Letter 1178 as an information only filing to provide an update on the project through the March 30, 2017 deadline. This Advice Letter was approved with an effective date of October 26, 2017 (Workpaper 300).

The second filing was authorized to be filed within 90 days after the pipeline and pump station are completed and fully in service. The Monterey pump station was placed into service on January 3, 2019, and the Monterey pipeline was placed into service on January 16, 2019. This Advice Letter is filed within 90 days of the facilities being placed into service.

¹ Failure to meet any milestone could result in a reduction of up to 1,000 acre-feet per year in authorized Carmel River water diversions for each missed milestone, and diversions in excess of authorized amounts could potentially result in significant monetary penalties for violations of the amended Cease and Desist Order and for unlawful diversions of water.

D.16-09-021, Ordering Paragraph 6 provided that "The authorization to build the pipeline and pump station is subject to a cost cap of \$50.3 million² for the combined pipeline and pump station project. If actual costs exceed the cap, California-American Company is authorized to file a Tier 3 advice letter to seek additional recovery." Total project costs excluding AFUDC are \$50,311,750 which is less than the authorized cost cap, and therefore CAW files this request as a Tier 2 advice letter. Total project costs of \$56,217,146 requested for recovery include estimated AFUDC accrual for April 2019. Additional AFUDC accrued, as well as depreciation and property tax expenses incurred, prior to the effective date of the rate implementation will be tracked in the existing Coastal Water Project Memorandum Account. Detailed project costs are provided in Appendix B of Binder 1.

D.16-09-021 further provided description of three particular cost factors that are to be considered in review of this advice letter filing. These factors are that the costs 1) are to be for facilities that are used and useful, 2) must be reasonable, and 3) are for facilities that are appropriately sized. These factors are addressed below and further expanded upon in the in the project memo provided as Binder 1 to this Advice Letter.

1) Project Costs are for Used and Useful Facilities

The Monterey Pump Station was placed into service on January 3, 2019 and the Monterey Pipeline was placed into service on January 16th, 2019. As described in the project memo included as Binder 1, the pressure in the Monterey Pipeline can be increased to overcome the hydraulic trough in the existing distribution system. Since being placed into service, the Monterey Pipeline has successfully delivered water for ASR injection. Water is being pumped through the pipeline via the Hilby Pump Station. The water pumped through the Monterey Pipeline bypasses the majority of the distribution system, in particular the "trough" part of the system. This avoids increasing the pressure in the distribution system.

Since being placed in service the MPPS has also been used to maximize ASR injections. Since being put into service on January 3, 2019, the MPPS has been delivering an average of 1500 gpm for ASR injection (900 acre-feet injected to date for all ASR sources) with a peak injection rate of 6000 gpm. This peak injection rate would not have been possible without the MPPS facilities.

As stated above, the MPPS will allow CAW to maximize the benefits of water produced by GWR once GWR water becomes available. The GWR or PWM project will provide 3,500 AFY of water available to CAW that will result in a direct 1:1 reduction in the use of Carmel River water supply. The GWR project is under construction and water supply is anticipated to be available to CAW beginning in 2020.

2) Project Costs are Reasonable

² The \$50.3 million provided in the body of the Decision was a rounded number based on a total estimate of \$50,331,541.

As stated above, the total project cost for the MPPS was \$50,311,750, which is below the authorized cost cap of \$50,331,541. Per previous direction provided by Water Division regarding ratebase offset supporting documentation, CAW is providing detailed cost breakdown in Appendix B of Binder 1. These supporting worksheets and cost detail support the reasonableness of the project costs.

A selection committee was established by CAW to evaluate and select the most reasonable construction bids based upon both technical and financial criteria. The technical criteria were weighted at 40% and included aspects such as project delivery, schedule and safety. The financial criteria were weighted at 60% and included aspects such as cost effectiveness, business conditions and proposers' financial qualifications.

Six contractors submitted individual bid packages which were evaluated by the selection committee. Bid packages for this phase of the project included the Monterey Pipeline (bid package 5) and the Hilby Pump Station (bid package 7). Garney Construction was the selected proposer for the Monterey Pipeline, while Monterey Peninsula Engineering was the selected proposer for the Hilby Pump Station. The primary factors favoring the selected proposers were cost effectiveness, the level of acceptance of the terms and conditions of the draft contract and a strong overall technical approach to completing the work within the schedule.

The project included \$11,773,170 of spend by diverse suppliers. This included work performed by subcontractors and inspection staff.

The project benefitted from design changes that resulted in reduced scope and cost. This included (1) reducing the width of the pipeline trench which reduced labor and material costs, (2) leaving in service approximately 3,000 feet of existing 12" water line that was originally designed to be removed, (3) work with City of Monterey to change their paving requirement from full width paving to slurry seal for affected streets, and (4) work with City of Seaside to change paving requirements for a 1 mile segment of affected roadway to utilize recycled paving for paving material.

3) Project Facilities are Appropriately Sized

Monterey Pipeline

The Monterey Pipeline was sized based on the capacity of the future desalination plant (~5,500 gpm peak capacity), and ASR and recycled water (PWM) extraction operations (up to ~9,000 gpm) for a total of approximately 14,500 gpm, while maintaining appropriate pressures and velocities. The ASR extraction capacity includes the proposed ASR Wells 5 and 6 as part of the MPWSP. Based on operations to date, the pipeline and pump station have performed as designed in delivering increased ASR injection flows up to approximately 6,000 gpm in 2019, with more capacity available when ASR 5 and 6 are complete.

The existing distribution system had several locations along the Monterey Pipeline alignment where water services were fed from dual distribution pipelines, limiting the amount of space available for the Monterey Pipeline. As part of the project, services at these locations were consolidated to a single new distribution pipeline. The older pipeline was abandoned and removed to allow for space for the Monterey Pipeline. The result was faster construction times due to additional spacing, and reduction in future O&M costs as a result of removing the older pipeline. This occurred on Madison, Polk, Hartnell and Webster Streets and on Mark Thomas Drive in the City of Monterey.

The Hilby (Monterey) Pump Station

Sizing of the Hilby Pump station was based on maximum permitted Carmel River diversions for ASR injection of approximately 6,500 gpm. The pump station was sized to deliver approximately 6,000 gpm for ASR injection and including a minimum 40 psi at the well head, while remaining flows of about 500 gpm can be delivered from Crest Tank. The 40 psi is an operational requirement for well injection. The Hilby Pump Station will reduce overall O&M costs for CAW. Currently, water for ASR injection is pumped from well sources in Carmel Valley to the Segunda Tank and pumped again to the Crest Tank which is the highest point in CAWs distribution system. With the Hilby Pump Station, water is now delivered to Forest Lake Storage Tanks, which is lower than Crest, and then through the Monterey Pipeline, where it is then boosted slightly by Hilby Pump Station to the ASR injection wells. While this new route is longer, less electricity is used due to reduced elevation lift. Thus, the Hilby Pump Station is performing as designed and is appropriately sized.

Revenue Impact:

CAW's authorized revenue requirement for Test Year 2018 for the Central Division was adopted in D.18-12-021. In compliance with D.18-12-021, on March 27, 2019, CAW filed AL 1236 seeking approval of the 2019 step rate increase with an effective date of May 11, 2019. Subsequent to this filing CAW identified a discrepancy in the AL 1236 workpapers and will be filing a supplemental Advice Letter 1236A in the near future to address this item. Although the relief requested within this advice letter can become effective 30 days after filing CAW requests it become effective on May 11, 2019, in coordination with the 2019 step increase. This will decrease the number of rate changes and reduce customer confusion.

With this advice letter CAW requests authorization to increase the revenue requirement for the Central Division by \$7,924,300 or 12.99% over the 2019 step revenue requirement requested in AL 1236A. This will provide for a total authorized operating revenue of \$68,291,000 for the Central Division. Rates will increase for the Central Division, including the Monterey Main, Bishop, and Ryan Ranch service areas, but excluding the Ralph Lane, Chualar, Toro, and Garrapata service areas. Workpapers are provided as Workpaper 100.

Tier Designation:

Pursuant to D16-09-021 Ordering Paragraph 7, this advice letter is submitted with a Tier 2 designation.

Effective Date:

CAW requests an effective date of May 11, 2019, corresponding with the requested effective date of the 2019 step rate increase requested in AL 1236. This effective date is more than 30 days from the date of this filing.

NOTICE:

Pursuant to Section 4.3 of General Order No. 96-B, a copy of this advice letter is being sent to those entities listed in the attached "SERVICE LIST PURSUANT TO SECTION 4.3 OF G.O. NO. 96-B." Additionally, a copy of this advice letter is being sent to the service list of Application 12-04-019. Copies of the detailed workpapers and the documents supporting this Advice Letter have also been furnished to the Commission Staff.

In accordance with Section 4.2 of General Order 96-B, Cal-Am shall give affected customers at least 30 days notice before the requested effective date of May 11, 2019. Said notice will be provided via direct mailing.

RESPONSE OR PROTEST

Anyone may submit a response or protest for this AL. When submitting a response or protest, please include the utility name and advice letter number in the subject line.

A response supports the filing and may contain information that proves useful to the Commission in evaluating the AL. A protest objects to the AL in whole or in part and must set forth the specific grounds on which it is based. These grounds³ are:

- 1. The utility did not properly serve or give notice of the AL;
- 2. The relief requested in the AL would violate statute or Commission order, or is not authorized by statute or Commission order on which the utility relies;
- 3. The analysis, calculations, or data in the AL contain material error or omissions;
- 4. The relief requested in the AL is pending before the Commission in a formal proceeding; or
- 5. The relief requested in the AL requires consideration in a formal hearing, or is otherwise inappropriate for the AL process: or
- 6. The relief requested in the AL is unjust, unreasonable, or discriminatory, provided that such a protest may not be made where it would require relitigating a prior order of the Commission.

A protest may not rely on policy objections to an AL where the relief requested in the AL follows rules or directions established by statute or Commission order applicable to the utility. A protest shall provide citations or proofs where available to allow staff to properly consider the protest.
